IN-PERSON VIEWING

The technologies of today have kept moving forward, in spite of COVID-19. Although in-person HHD was canceled, our editors and equipment manufacturers filmed actual haying demonstrations and live cattle handling demonstrations at HHD last fall, and combined that footage with corn harvest demonstrations filmed at the Farm Progress Show site to bring the Farm Progress Virtual Experience.



International Visitors Center open for business

HUSKER HARVEST DAYS is a premiere show for many reasons — one of them is its location in Nebraska, the nation's top irrigation state, with an array of irrigation manufacturers.

Irrigation technology and the hundreds of exhibitors touting new products and systems are also reasons that Husker Harvest Days has become a destination for visitors from not only across the country, but also around the world.

Before COVID-19 canceled the 2020 show, Farm Progress in 2019 partnered with the Nebraska Department of Agriculture and the Department of Economic Development, along with Valmont Industries, to unveil a new International Visitors Center on the show site.

NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES

Located at the northeast corner of Central Avenue and Main Street on Lot 34 — just north of the Hospitality Tent — the visitors center offers hospitality, networking and opportunities to connect U.S. and international agricultural business interests.

Matt Jungmann, Farm Progress national events director, says Nebraska is a hub for irrigation companies and irrigation equipment like center pivots. The products are being shipped not only to farmers within a three-hour drive of Husker Harvest Days, but also to farmers all over the globe.

"It's fair to say HHD is one of the best exhibits they [companies] put up to display their new technology and tools, and it's one of the best places for folks to come and learn about it. It would be great if we can attract growers all over the world to HHD," Jungmann says

The last time an in-person Husker Harvest Days show was held, Nebraska companies used the International Visitors Center to give presentations in a kind of matchmaking platform. If visitors were interested in learning more about the company, they could watch the presentation and make a point to visit its exhibit at Husker Harvest Days.

At that time, the U.S. Commercial Service, the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln also made presentations at the International Visitors Center.

With his support and promotion of Nebraska products and companies to a strong list of specific countries, Gov. Pete Ricketts firmly supports and promotes the International Visitors Center at HHD.

GETTING BACK TO NORMAL

While things have opened considerably in Nebraska over the past few months, COVID-19 restrictions are still in place in many countries around the world. This challenges the continuing efforts of international travelers to make connections with international growers at the show.


However, the International Visitors Center, with Chief Agri joining Valley Irrigation as a sponsor, will be open for business. The format for 2021 will be similar to 2019, providing networking and connections for Nebraska businesses with an international interest and scope, and offering a place for presentations to international business interests and growers.

In fact, the International Visitors Center at Husker Harvest Days will feature an Exporter Education hour from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sept. 15 to help growers and exhibitors understand the state and federal resources available to assist in the exporting process.

Chief Construction works to revitalize rural areas

CHIEF. IF YOU'RE a farmer, the mere utterance of the name brings to mind images of shiny, metallic, galvanized steel in the farmyard. However, if you live in Grand Island, it may conjure images of brick and glass. If you're from Aurora, you may recall vinyl siding and asphalt roof shingles. That's because Chief Industries is reaching out and improving all aspects of life in rural Nebraska.

The Grand Island-based company has spent more than 60 years helping farmers and ranchers add on-farm grain storage with its big round bins. Chief started back in 1954 as a construction company, says Roger Bullington, general manager and president of Chief Construction and Development.

"We've always been rooted in construction," he says, "whether that was grain bin materials or metal buildings."

But 10 years ago, the company decided to expand into the development space.

NEW MEDICAL COMPLEX

Chief purchased more than 100 acres on the edge of Grand Island at the intersection of Highway 34 South and Highway 281. The first project on the site was the Grand Island Regional Medical Center.

The hospital is a \$115 million project. The 67-bed facility provides emergency care, surgery, labor and delivery, imaging and diagnostics like MRI and CT, endoscopy, interventional procedures, a catheterization lab, and a pharmacy. It came to fruition with the help of 80 doctor-investors.

Bullington says developments like a

hospital not only serve the aging rural population, but also attract young professionals.

He points out that many small towns in Nebraska have employment opportunities but lack housing and amenities like quality hospitals.

Chief is adding more to the Prairie Commons site. It just completed a medical office building and is working on a 157-unit independent, senior-living facility. But it is not all concrete buildings, Bullington says, there is a lot of green space.

Two miles of hiking and biking trails will weave their way through Prairie Commons. "We are promoting a healthy lifestyle, along with marrying development with the natural environment," he notes. "There are no pole signs, only monument signs. There is a water feature with a fountain. It has just more rich amenities in the development."

It's the small details that young families look for in a new area, he says. "We want Grand Island to be a place where you can work, live and thrive in the area," he adds. The company is taking that mission to even more regions of rural Nebraska.

IMPROVED HOUSING OUTLOOK

In many small communities, there is a housing shortage. In Aurora, which boasts a little more than 4,400 people, merely 9% the population of Grand Island, there are jobs available, but few affordable family homes, says Mike Morrow, sales and engineering manager for BonnaVilla, a division of Chief Industries.

"The entry-level home building does not offer enough scale to attract builders to come in and build those types of homes," Morrow explains. So, the company worked with a rural development corporation to build 10 homes back in 2017.

Morrow says the homes are between 1,100 and 1,300 square feet, each with a target price, at the time, of under \$200,000.

"There was a need for an inventory of homes for people to select from when they moved to the area," Morrow added.

The homes are either three-bedroom, two-bath, or two-bedroom, two-bath, de-

pending on the design.

BonnaVilla produces modular homes, meaning they are built in its facility and then transported to the housing development and placed on, in this case, a full basement.

"It is the same as if you built it on-site," Morrow explains. "All of the materials would be the same as used in a traditional home build. And for bank financing, because it is on a basement, it is the same as a conventional home. There's no difference."

Individuals purchase not only the home, but also the plot of land it sits on. "It is just like any subdivision," he says.

ENTRY-LEVEL HOMES

Morrow sees more potential for these types of home developments in the future.

"This would solve a major problem, which is lack of entry-level homes, in a lot of these rural communities," he says. "This gives us an opportunity to participate in solving the problem many of our communities face — finding more employees to work and live in small towns."

Whether grain bins, hospitals or housing, Chief Industries is dedicated to improving Nebraska's farms and small towns

"It's kind of what we like to do — to provide a lot of the components that these rural communities really need to continue to grow, or even to try and maintain their population," Bullington says.

For Arens it is all about what's new in irrigation equipment. "With water being such a critical part of Nebraska's row crop

success, I think it is important to find those pieces of equipment that can help

producers manage this resource on the farm," he says.

But Arens also has a mind for livestock equipment, as the Nebraska native knows a thing or two about cattle since he is not only the Nebraska

"I love visiting with companies to

see what they have new to make handling cattle faster and safer on the farm," he says.

Arens also looks at new products from feed bunks to electric fence.

Ward travels to Nebraska to get a look at

hay equipment. She says Husker Harvest Days often offers ranchers the first look at a new product. "When Vermeer unveiled its self-propelled baler at Husker Harvest Days in 2017, it was exciting to be at the event and field demonstration," she says. "I think farmers attend HHD because they know it offers all the latest technology for growers."

The cadre have decades of combined

experience writing about new products and researching price points. They gather their new product information and share it with readers throughout the year.

Ward says the team is not always looking for the flashiest product. "Sometimes you find that small item that

makes you ask, 'Why didn't I think of that," she says.

Try to spot one of the five at this year's Husker Harvest Days. They will be on the show site working, but feel free to walk up and visit with them about your favorite piece of equipment, or just take a selfie and post it.

You will find the Husker Harvest Days new products throughout the year in the pages of Nebraska Farmer and other Farm Progress publications.







Raven autonomous tech ready to head to fields

YOUR FARM SHOW trip won't be complete unless you check out the autonomous equipment. At least two autonomous machines will be operating. One of those will make a brief exit each day from the designated autonomy zone to participate in combining demonstrations.

Both technologies slated to be on display are Raven products. They're direct results of the emphasis Raven placed on its Autonomy Division in recent years. Both showcase technologies that are available today for farmers.

Here's a closer look at each technology. The information is supplied by Raven.

OMNIDRIVE

The goal behind OmniDrive is to eliminate the need for a driver in the tractor pulling the grain cart to unload the combine on the go.

With labor hard to find in some parts of the country, that means one fewer employee is needed for harvest. It also removes the stress and fatigue factor that can sometimes increase during a long day and especially during the season for the person designated to drive the auger cart and catch the combine when it's ready to unload.

This product puts together various pieces of technology Raven had developed or acquired over time. From the seat in the combine cab, the farmer can monitor and operate a driverless tractor pulling the

grain cart. The farmer can unload on the go, and then direct the driverless tractor and grain cart to return to a predetermined unloading area where the cart unloads into a semitrailer or gravity wagon.

You can see the equipment that makes OmniDrive work each day from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Field 3.

OMNIPOWER

Take a good look at this self-propelled power platform that is designed to easily interchange farm implements like a spreader or sprayer to do multiple tasks around the farm without a driver. Dot Technology Corp. originally developed the platform, and Raven provided technology that can steer, guide and propel the machine through the field.

Raven debuted this unit equipped with a fertilizer spreader at the Farm Progress Show site near Boone, Iowa, in 2020. It spread fertilizer without a driver over a 40-acre field during filming for the Farm Progress Virtual Experience. But now you can see it in person. It will be demonstrated throughout each day of the show.

Raven says to expect more advancements with this power platform. It's still viewed as a power source that can accept units to do various field tasks.

A farmer can control it from a tablet or laptop, and send it on autonomous missions without a human driver. Learn more at *ravenind.com*.

After 2 years, show has plenty of goods to see

THE MARCH OF innovation is relentless, thanks to engineers, chemists and plant breeders. Their goal is to improve your productivity, crop yield and income — and they kept on working even during the pandemic. Now, they can finally show you their progress in person.

When the gates open at Husker Harvest Days, Sept. 14-16, in Grand Island, these innovators will share a range of ag tech—from the hardware of new equipment to the software of new crop protection products. A visit to the show will be a two-year data dump for visitors.

Farm Progress has reached out to a few companies to find out what they want to share, knowing they're saving the best for the day the show opens.

Yet from the new tools introduced last year for the Farm Progress Virtual Experience to new products announced in press releases, here are a few items to whet your appetite for a trip to Grand Island. But be aware that a lot more products will be on hand than could ever be listed here.

DRIVER-FREE APPROACHES

The creation of the Omni platform at Raven Industries created a lot of buzz earlier in 2021 as the company pulled together disparate brands under a single umbrella. What was once the Dot Technology autonomous tractor is now OmniPower, and what was once AutoCart has become OmniDrive. And while Raven was recently acquired by CNH Industrial, those autonomous machines will be on display at the show, too.

MORE ON THE MAJORS

With Case IH, speed is the word, with news of new hay tools designed for faster road and field transport to boost productivity.

Over at New Holland, look for a new Speedrower self-propelled windrower lineup featuring a top-to-bottom update for the line. In addition, there are some cosmetic changes to the lineup of balers, harkening back to the New Holland heritage colors and appearance.

In addition, the company will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of its skid-steer loader line. And visitors may also see the T7 tractor with PLM Intelligence, as well as a CR combine celebrating 45 years of twin-rotor technology.

Agco is essentially bringing two years of new equipment to its stand — from the new Massey Ferguson 8S tractor to a first-time exhibit of the full Fendt lineup, including a machine being introduced

to North America. The company has launched the Fendt One Operator Interface on its Fendt 700, introduced the new Fendt 900 Vario MT Track tractors, released the Fendt 300 Vario Series and rolled out the 1100 Vario MT tractors.

John Deere has a range of new tools, including the 8RX tractor with its add-on tanks and the X9 combine, to view. Details of other equipment on hand were still being worked out at press time.

Kubota, known for tractors, is also expanding its hay tool lineup with new disk mower conditioners, a new baler series and a wrapper. The company is also backing the new tools with expanded warranties.

SHORT-LINE ROLLOUTS

Short-line companies bring a range of innovations to the show every year. For 2022, with two years of new ideas to share, there should be plenty to see. A large number of the new products and innovations that the Farm Progress New Products Team finds at Husker Harvest Days comes from short-line companies.

Here's a sampling of what you'll be able to find at the 2021 show:

AGuru. The new company is exhibiting at the show for the first time with an innovative strip-till bar design.

Unverferth. A longtime innovator in the strip-till market, Unverferth is launching the Raptor strip-till tool. The company pulled together a range of innovations to prepare a strip for planting while preserving organic matter in the soil. And having covered Unverferth for many years at the show, the Farm Progress New

Products Team knows there will be more new products at the exhibit to see as well.

Brandt. The company has launched a new Land Roller and will have one of the largest models at the show, with 36- and 42-inch-diameter heavyweight drums. And the design features what the company calls "true drum overlap."

Brandt will also show off its new XT Grain Carts. These carts were on display during the Farm Progress Virtual Experience, and their features caught the eye of the small number of farmers invited to view the machines.

AGI. The company, which continues to innovate in the grain handling business, will be putting its new FieldLab and FieldProbe on display. The tools are new for 2021.

The FieldLab is a real-time, in-hand unit that provides grain analysis, providing spectrometer-level accuracy.

The FieldProbe can help determine optimum planting time and manage irrigation. The unit, when used with AGI SureTrack Field Data Manager, helps model growing degree units to project crop maturity to help manage harvest, too.

Highline. The company has launched the BP60 Bale Pro Series of bale processors, which will be on hand. The series offers a range of models and options to meet specific bale handling issues on the farm.

With more than 500 exhibitors on-site, this is a short list of new machines to check out, but it's a sure bet there will be plenty of new tools and technologies to check out.

Pick your road; it'll lead to Husker Harvest Days

DEPENDING ON WHERE you are driving from, you can always get to Husker Harvest Days.

The Husker Harvest Days site is located 6 miles west of Grand Island on Husker Highway. Show staff and Farm Progress editors will be waiting to greet you each day of the show.

To make sure you arrive at your destination, here are the official routes to the site, no matter which direction you're coming from.

FROM NORTHWEST

Take Highway 2 to Cairo and turn right (south) on Highway 11. At Husker Highway, turn left (east) and head to the show site.

FROM SOUTHWEST


Take Interstate 80 east to Exit 300. At the exit ramp, go north on Highway 11. At Husker Highway, turn right (east) and head to the show site.

FROM EAST AND SOUTHEAST

Take I-80 west to Exit 312; turn north on Highway 281. Follow Highway 281 to Highway 30. Turn west on Highway 30 to Husker Highway. Then turn right on Husker Highway and head to the show site.

FROM NORTH AND NORTHEAST

Take Highway 281 south into Grand Island to Husker Highway. At Husker Highway, turn right (west) and head to the show site.





Safety still part of 'ag family reunion'

WHEN IT COMES to extra safety precautions at Husker Harvest Days in the wake of COVID-19, Matt Jungmann, Farm Progress national events director, says much of the change happens behind the scenes with increased sanitation services.

"We have people that are going to come to the show who are bound and determined not to let COVID change their life whatsoever. And they should be able to experience a show like that," Jungmann says. "And then we'll have people that are going to want to maintain a little distance and change their behavior a little bit. And we're sensitive to that.

"So, we're going to have some areas for them to stretch out and get away from

the crowd a little bit. For the most part, it should be a fairly normal experience at Husker Harvest Days."

For those coming to the show, Sept. 14-16, in Grand Island, they can count on these safety precautions:

Hand sanitizer stations. Jungmann says

the show site will increase the amount of hand-sanitizing stations throughout the grounds.

Face mask availability. Face makes are not required for entry or while inside Husker Harvest Days show grounds. Jungmann says individuals are free to make a choice to wear a mask.

This year's return to normal for Husker Harvest Days is what Jungmann deems "a celebration."

"We've made it through a year being separated," he says. "Now is a time to come together as an agriculture family like a bit of a family reunion, just hanging out kicking tires and talking equipment."

GOLF CART RULES

To keep drivers, walkers and vendors safe, golf cart operators must follow these rules:

- Pedestrians have the right of way.
- Golf carts may not exceed 5 mph.



GROUP OUTING: For many Husker Harvest Days visitors, it is a gathering place of old friends and family. Getting around the 640-acre show can be easier with a golf cart.

- Golf carts may not be used to enter an exhibit. They must remain in the street without obstructing access to the exhibit space. Operators who drive into exhibits and tents will lose their permit, and the golf cart will be removed from the exhibit area.
- No pull-behind attachments to golf carts are permitted.
- Operators must remove the key from the vehicle when the golf cart is vacated.
- Golf carts may not transport more individuals than the number of seats available in the golf cart.
- Operators must be a minimum of 25 years of age.
- Operators must operate vehicles in a safe and prudent manner.

In those situations where questions arise relative to any aspect of these rules and regulations, Husker Harvest Days management shall be responsible for all final decisions.



The app offers direct access to American Agriculturist, Dakota Farmer, Indiana Prairie Farmer, Kansas Farmer, Michigan Farmer, Missouri Ruralist, Nebraska Farmer, Ohio Farmer, Prairie Farmer, The Farmer, Wallaces Farmer, Western Farmer-Stockman and Wisconsin Agriculturist.

Growing Degree Days. The Growing Degree Days application measures the maturity of your crop by viewing current and past growing degree days data from your farm's location. GDD is a measure of heat accumulation used in agriculture to predict the date crops will reach maturity.

Touch the map pin to display growing degree days for your current location. Move the map pin to see growing degree days for a different location.

Growing degree days are listed by month and summarized for the year. The current year's growing degree days are compared to the previous year's growing degree days.

Grain Storage Manager. The Grain Storage Manager app is a free tool developed for grain farmers that allows them to manage the storage of their crops from the field to the

bin, and then to delivery or sale. The GSM app lets users easily create virtual bins; set their capacity, location and crop; and then track the crop loaded in or loaded out of that bin throughout the year. The graphic interface shows the current usage (percentage of capacity), total bushels housed and each transaction recorded for loads in and out of the bin.

The GSM app is the best way to track grain during harvest and throughout the year. The phone app makes it easy and convenient to keep track of loads into your bins or loads into the local elevator. All the data are stored in the cloud and are immediately available.

No more keeping track of scale tickets or wondering how much grain you hauled to town. You'll easily be able to know when it is time to move augers and know which bins have room for more grain.







Where to find ATM, first aid and more

HUSKER HARVEST DAYS offers many small-town amenities right in the middle of farm fields. Whether you are short on cash or need first aid, the show has you covered.

Nursing station. Nursing moms can head to the nurse's station located in the northwest corner of the grounds. A camper located near the first-aid station will provide moms with a comfortable area.

Parking. Parking for all visitor vehicles is located adjacent to the show site. Farm Progress is not responsible for damage to vehicles.

Restrooms. Permanent restrooms are located on Lot 724, on Seventh Street just east of Central Avenue. Permanent rest-

rooms also are located on Fifth Street at Lot 540. Portable restrooms are located at many areas throughout the show site. See your site map at the back of the program for exact locations.

Pet policy


No pets are permitted on the Husker Harvest Days show site except service animals, which must remain on a leash at all times.

The shuttles circle the perimeter of the exhibit grounds, allowing riders off at several different points throughout the show. Look for the signs at the visitor parking gate and around the exhibitor grounds.

Personalize your visit with My Show Planner

EVERYONE WHO ATTENDS Husker Harvest Days Sept. 14-16 in Grand Island has a lot of ground to cover in just three days, but you can apply a little technology to the task and maximize your time.

The website *HuskerHarvestDays.com* offers a powerful tool — My Show Planner — that provides you with a map of the exhibit field, exhibitor list and show site.

EASY SETUP

Here's a step-by-step setup for a personalized visit to Husker Harvest Days with My Show Planner:

- 1. Visit HuskerHarvestDays.com.
- 2. Click on the "Show Map & Exhibitors List" in the top right corner of the page.
- Click on "My Show Planner" at the far right of the page; it has a bell next to it.
- **4.** Register with an email and password.

- 5. Add events, exhibitors and products to your personalized My Show Planner. If you are not sure what exhibits to visit, you can choose from a few featured exhibitors.
- **6.** Carry it with you. Print out a paper version of the map with your selected vendors. Or find your My Show Planner on the Husker Harvest Days app (see Page 20).

MAP IT OUT

When you first see the show map in My Show Planner, it's going to look odd. But just like our new product team's strategy, the map is divided into four quadrants. That's a quick view of the map, and you can hover over spaces with your mouse to find out who is where.

My Show Planner also calls that map the "Floor plan," which gives a bird's-eye view of the layout of the show grounds.

From here, clicking on any area en-

larges it and gives more details. You can click the mouse on a field and see demos and times for that field.

If you click on the exhibit field and hover over a lot number, it will tell you the name of the exhibitor on that lot. The site also has a feature that allows you to zoom in and out.

POWERFUL SEARCH

"Everything you need to know is based on that page," says Matt Jungmann, Farm Progress national events director. That includes a search function for you to find a specific company, or specific category of products.

Know you want to visit with "XYZ"? No problem. Simply type the name in the "Keyword search bar" at the top of the map page.

But the search function is even more useful for finding products and categories.

"For example, if you want to know all

the exhibitors who have tractors at the show, click on 'Tractors' and a list will pop up," Jungmann says.


"You can then add the ones you are interested into your show agenda," Jungmann adds. "No matter what you search for [name, product, etc.], when you click on it, you are taken back to the map, and it shows you where they are located."

And if you select a featured exhibitor, which is a choice once you've registered, those companies provide added information such as address, phone and fax numbers; email addresses; product photos; and links to the company's website.

"Often when farmers get home, they misplace information or simply want to obtain more information," Jungmann says. "They can go back to this site and find that information."

"If there's a sudden death, then your back is against the wall, and you could make bad decisions because of stress. It's important to make sure we think about this while everything is going well - instead of during a crisis."

Vyhnalek will be offering advice on ranch succession and transition planning during daily sessions at 11 a.m. on the Hospitality Tent stage at Husker Harvest

Earn money in farming's off season

CROP FARMERS OFTEN look to supplement their income during the winter months, but they may not find this opportunity inside their farm gates. It can be difficult to locate an extra job that allows the flexibility needed to run a farming operation. Yet, one Nebraska company offers an opportunity to make extra money during the downtime on the farm.

"Everybody is always looking to supplement their income," says Mandee Lade, driver recruiter for Chief Carriers. "Chief thought it would be a good idea to offer something that could supplement their income, while helping to close the gap on the driver shortage."

Lade says farmers should consider becoming a part-time, or what Chief Carrier calls a "casual," driver.

FLEXIBLE POSITION

During winter, while life on the farm slows down, Chief is still hauling freight across the Midwest.

"We are transporting products from our Grand Island and Kearney [Neb.] plants within a 150-to 400-mile radius, and we need drivers," Lade explains.

Chief Industries Inc. is a family-owned group of companies with products used in agriculture, commercial construction, structural steel, factory-built housing and ethanol production businesses, as well as in the transportation industry.

"The nice thing about a farmer is, he or she is already out working in the elements and understands how to move large equipment," she says. Farmers choose the days and miles they want to haul.

"We are very flexible on a work schedule," Lade adds. And the company works around the farmer's calendar.

"If by the end of February and March, they need to take off to get ready for planting, that is fine," she explains. "But there may be weather that prevents them from getting into the field. During that lag time is when they can be making money running short loads here in Nebraska."

Working for Chief Carriers is a yearround position, with opportunities to work during the summer and fall months.

SIGNING ON

Lade says Chief Carriers' driving program benefits retired farmers, active farmers or even farm kids home from college.

The application process is simple.

Farmers only need to apply online once.

Drivers must be at least 23 years old with no DUI, DWI or drug convictions in the past five years. Drivers need Class A over-the-road experience of at least one year. Lade says that while flatbed experience is preferred, the company will train

the right candidate. Grand Island is the home base for the start of truck hauls.

One benefit to the job is after driving 1,000 hours, a farmer can opt to contribute to the company's 401(k) plan.

Chief Carriers says the program is a winwin for both the company and farmers.

"Being a driver with us allows for them to make money while allowing Chief Carriers to hire knowledgeable, experienced individuals to help fill in for our fulltime employees who are taking vacation or need time off," Lade says. "We take a lot of pride in being a company that focuses on family, working hard and making an honest living, much like our farmers."

You won't go hungry at Husker Harvest Days

YOU CAN'T WALK the streets at Husker Harvest Days without getting hungry. Aromatic smoke rolls off the grills, luring customers to food vendors scattered across every section of the show site. You can grab breakfast, a light snack or a big meal at the various nonprofit vendors.

And the variety is wide-ranging. Want a big pork loin or a steak sandwich? You've come to the right place. How about great burgers? No problem. Everyone's food tastes can be satisfied. Here is a look at food vendors on the show grounds in 2021.

PORK PLACE

Stop by the Pork Place in the southeast quadrant of the exhibit field on Lot 915 to enjoy the hospitality of the volunteers from Sutton Christian School. They have become known for their bacon burgers and smoked pork loin sandwiches.

If you still need more protein, try their Husker Burger, which combines both the sliced smoked pork loin and the bacon burger into one giant sandwich. And don't miss out on its root beer floats.

Sara Johnson has been helping coordinate the Pork Place and the school's volunteers. "The funds we raise at HHD are very important," she says. "Sutton Christian is a very small school. We're not a booster club, and the funds we raise don't go toward athletics or extracurriculars. It goes toward paying teachers' salaries and toward the general fund of the school."

Johnson says about 100 volunteers, including teachers, parents, students and other residents from the community volunteer to get the shifts covered.

She notes that in addition to their regular menu items, exhibitors can preorder and have food catered to their location.

EAGLE'S NEST

You can't miss the Eagle's Nest, operated by Wood River Rural Schools, in the southeast quadrant on Lot 734 near the intersection of Central Avenue and Main Street.

Its homemade breakfast sandwiches are popular, along with its cinnamon rolls, and cherry and apple turnovers. For lunch, stop by for personal-pan pizzas from Pizza Hut, or hamburgers and cheeseburgers. The stand is staffed by about 30 students daily, with at least that many adult volunteers, including alumni, parents and teachers.

"Every year, we try to invite a local celebrity to come out and help, and we try to make sure they have their presence well-known when they are at Husker Harvest Days," says Jodi Rauert, with the Wood River Rural Schools Booster Club. These celebrities have included Wood River's mayor and a former Husker football player.

HHD plays a huge role in funding extracurricular activities at Wood River, which comprises about 300 students from junior high through high school.

"This is our only fundraiser for the year," Rauert says. "This covers funding for everything from sporting events to plays to band to leadership seminars to any other extracurricular activity."

THE HULA HUT

The Hula Hut on Lot 938, operated by the Grand Island Senior High School's

raise funds from meal sales that help with school operations, extracurricular activities and other educational endeavors.

Islander Athletic Booster Club, will offer its famous beef brisket sandwiches, hamburgers, cheeseburgers and breakfast burritos. And its Old Country Kettle Corn will be made on-site this year.

New bacon-inspired items this year will be a bacon cheeseburger and Pig on a Stick, a bacon-wrapped pork chop. John Wemhoff and his wife, Cindy, coordinate the Hula Hut. He says it's not the intention to "change just to change, but I know that nobody has this," referring to Pig on a Stick.

The "Hula Hut" name is a play on the high school's team name, the Islanders, and diners should be on the lookout for mascot Hula Helen. She might be standing out front of Hula Hut welcoming diners.

It takes a crew of 60 student and parent volunteers to run an efficient shop. Every time a student-athlete volunteer works a shift, they are entered for scholarships to be given in their senior year. Funds raised from the Hula Hut also go to supplies or equipment for athletic activities.

GRAND ISLAND CENTRAL CATHOLIC

Grand Island Central Catholic Schools site on Third Street and Central Avenue offers steak sandwiches, hamburgers, brats, ice cream and homemade pies.

Over 150 students and 225 parents, teachers, Knights of Columbus members and Central Catholic alumni work the stand. Funds raised through their efforts go to projects and organizations in the school system, such as the fine arts department, school foundation and student council.

The group takes vendor orders and makes deliveries. They also have a breakfast menu for those out at the show early, including sausage, egg and cheese muffins.

GRAND ISLAND NW ATHLETIC BOOSTERS

The new kid on the block for food vendors this year is the Grand Island Northwest High School Athletic Boosters, who will be serving up steak Philly sandwiches, along with chicken Philly sandwiches from their stand on Lot 534, along Central Avenue between Fourth and Fifth streets.

Carlotta Hartman, one of the food stand coordinators, says the school has a strong connection with agriculture through its FFA program, so becoming a food vendor at HHD was an easy decision.

Northwest will also offer walking tacos and hot dogs. For breakfast, you won't want to miss its cinnamon rolls and breakfast sandwiches. Also, the group will be taking preorders.

Hartman says about 75 adults and students will be volunteering. Proceeds will help fund the athletic booster club, annual scholarships and athletic equipment.

Donate nonperishable food to help local families

THE LAST FEW years have been tough on the families served by Nebraska's Heartland United Way. They've endured floods, tornadoes and COVID-19. All of that only exacerbates the underlying issue — the ability to provide food for their families.

The group has been distributing 1,000 food boxes every week, sometimes twice a week depending on supply, according to Karen Rathke, Heartland United Way president. The disasters and especially COVID-19 have impacted giving.

Events, like Husker Harvest Days, which collected close to 13,000 pounds of food, could not take place in 2020.

"Our pantries got a little more bare," Rathke says.

So, this year she is hoping for more donations to replenish the shelves.

Much of the food donated goes to provide meals for children in the fourcounty area of Hall, Hamilton, Howard and Merrick. Here, 43% of all children

are eligible for free and reduced school lunch, compared to the statewide average of 42.1%. Within that same area, 10.7% of residents and 18% of children are food insecure. Meanwhile, 11.9% of Nebraska residents and 18.3% of all children in Nebraska are food insecure.

"There is nothing more heartbreaking than to see a child who is hungry," Rathke says. "That's what we're trying to make sure doesn't happen," and that the "impacts of poverty and COVID are not preventing children from being successful and thriving in our area."

FFA FOOD DRIVE HELPS

Each year, FFA members from across the state bring food donations to Husker Harvest Days as part of Heartland United Way's annual Food 4 Families food drive.

The food drive takes place all three days of the show and gives visitors a chance to donate nonperishable food

items before entering the show gates. And FFA members who donate Sept. 15, the second day of the show, receive free admission. Students must bring a minimum of five nonperishable food items. Food donations are taken at the bus entrance on the southwest corner of the grounds.

All the food is weighed, sorted and then

loaded on a truck. It is later distributed to shelters, food pantries and backpack programs throughout the Grand Island area.

REQUESTED ITEMS


In 2019, Rathke says individuals were encouraged to bring meal prep items, such as Hamburger Helper, or other box items that simply required an additional protein.

This year, they are encouraging donaions of:

- protein, such as canned chicken or tuna
- peanut butter
- soups and stews

"We appreciate FFA and HHD support and efforts to help serve the hungry and people who are homeless in our state," she says.

The Food 4 Families food drive is a partnership among Heartland United Way, Nebraska Farm Bureau, Aurora Cooperative and Farm Progress.



Get blood pressure, skin checked at health booths

HEALTH SCREENINGS MAY not be on the radar as an important use of time for farmers and ranchers, but nothing could be further from the truth. For many years, health screenings have been a crucial component—along with exhibits on rural safety, and health and wellness—in the Hospitality Tent at Husker Harvest Days.

These health exhibits and booths, along with blood pressure and skin cancer screenings, are often buzzing with activity as producers and visitors file through the area. Around 80 to 90 nursing students from the University of Nebraska Medical Center College of Nursing, from Kearney and Lincoln, play a key role in the health screenings, which provide learning opportunities for the UNMC students and wellness checks for HHD visitors.

The students provide blood pressure checks and help with the promotion of farm safety materials, according to Kami Loeffelholz, UNMC College of Nursing instructor at Kearney.

Also, a nurse practitioner will be onsite to assist with skin cancer screenings. The students helping with these screenings go through simulations to prepare for working in outdoor settings.

Typically, 1,000 to 1,200 people are screened for blood pressure and 600 receive skin screenings each year at HHD. One visitor who received these screenings in the past returned to tell instructors that a skin screening spurred a follow-up with a dermatologist, who in turn treated the person for Stage 4 skin cancer.

Others have taken their blood pressure

numbers from HHD to their practitioner and, after further assessment, started treatment for dangerously high blood pressure.

There is no statistical information to back up these anecdotes, but there is no

question that the health information and screenings at Husker Harvest Days bring health and wellness to the forefront for farmers and their families, and may alert these visitors to impending health concerns.

PREPARATIONS FOR THE ever-popular corn harvest demonstrations that take place each day of Husker Harvest Days begin in the spring with getting the corn in the ground in a timely manner.

Roger and Jason Luebbe, farm managers for Husker Harvest Days, say they take that responsibility seriously. The Luebbes and their crew work hard to get corn planting done on time each season, but weather is always a concern.

After years of caring for the crops at the show grounds, Roger and Jason have

seen it all. They have navigated the crops most recently through the drought of 2012 and the floods of 2019, with weather and storm conditions at the site running the gamut from perfect to not-so-perfect planting, growing and harvesting conditions, just like on other farms across the Great Plains.

GROWING SEASON STORY

This season, corn was planted in the harvest demo fields right on time on April 12 and was completed by April 14.

Although Grand Island had experienced heavy rain in the weeks before planting began, the fields at the show site were in good shape by mid-April for planting time.

Corn planted on the 300-plus acres of corn harvest demonstration fields had maturity ratings between 97 and 102 days, to ensure corn would be around 18% moisture when the combines rolled through the fields during the show.

Seed population at the site differs according to soil type and fertility pre-

scription, running from 34,000 to 38,000 populations in some spots, planted at a depth of $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

All the fields were planted using a Case IH 2130 Early Riser 16-row stacker planter with factory Precision Planting SpeedTubes and electric drives. The planter, which ran at a ground speed of about 8 mph, also sports hydraulic down pressure on the row units and wings.

WEATHER NEAR MISS AT SHOW SITE

Although a short cold snap occurred after planting, the corn germinated well and reached the standard of "knee high by the Fourth of July" and tasseled before July 8. By July 19, the corn crop was at blister stage.

Jason reports that damaging storms in July in the region luckily missed the show site.

"Everything looks really good right now," he says. "The demo corn is right on schedule for 18% moisture corn to be harvested during the show."

Corn harvest demonstrations are scheduled for 10:30 a.m. each day at Husker Harvest Days, followed by tillage demonstrations. Another pass by the combines in the harvest demonstration fields is set for 1 p.m. each day of the show, followed by the haying demonstrations at 2 p.m.



Learn rescue techniques for grain bin entrapment

GRAIN ENTRAPMENT CONTINUES to be a major farm safety issue causing multiple injuries and deaths each year. How to rescue someone trapped in grain will be a part of this year's Husker Harvest Days.

Cooperative Producers Inc. will provide live grain engulfment and rescue simulations at Husker Harvest Days on Lot 53 during the show. The training will be provided by the Safety and Technical Rescue Association (SATRA). Simulations will be done at least once an hour, with all ages welcome to participate and learn more about the dangers of grain entrapment.

FIRSTHAND EXPERIENCE IN GRAIN

The live simulations are done in a controlled environment but designed to be as real as possible. The demonstrations use

all safe bin-entry practices.

Show attendees can play the roles of either a bin entrant or attendant. The entrant, wearing a harness and lifeline, enters the simulator and becomes a victim of a grain entrapment. Three other attendants must work together to free the victim from the entrapment using a Res-Q Tube

Every attendee can experience what it feels like to be the victim of a grain entrapment and act as a rescuer. The experience drives home the point that grain entrapments present a true danger and that entrapment prevention is essential.

"Grain bin entrapments on the farm continue to be an ongoing concern, and anything we can do to help train our farmers and first responders on grain en-

gulfment rescue is a win in our book," says Doran Burmood, vice president of health and safety at Cooperative Producers Inc. "We're excited to offer HHD show attendees the ability to learn about the dangers of grain entrapment in a controlled environment."

State patrol officers learn to fly drones at HHD site

FLYING DRONES AROUND the Husker Harvest Days show site is nothing new. However, UAVs have been hovering around the show site in the off-season this past summer as well, not for use in agriculture, but in training exercises for the Nebraska State Patrol.

Lt. Brent Bockstadter, NSP coordinator for the Crash Reconstruction Program, says the Husker Harvest Days site has proven optimal for UAV pilot training for his troopers. These UAVs are being used to document accident scenes.

According to Bockstadter, the use of drones for documentation speeds up crash site cleanup, so traffic flow is not impeded as long. He says it saves time and money on investigations of accident scenes to create a reliable report of the

"At the Husker Harvest Days site, we have paved streets and intersections to allow us to replicate accident scenes," Bockstadter says. "It allows us to do the training without using normal roadways."

3 WEEKS OF TRAINING

NSP used the HHD site this past summer on three separate weeks to do training for their troopers in flying the drones.

"Nebraska State Patrol has trained 20 of our Crash Reconstruction personnel as

UAV pilots from across the state for this project, to cover the six troop areas that we divide the NSP operations up in the state," Bockstadter says.

"Based upon a projection of responding to a similar number of Crash Reconstruction investigations for serious injury or fatal crashes, and the published cost per hour for a road closure to the Commercial Vehicle Industry and private motorists, we project a nearly \$2 million savings per year to motoring public" through the use of UAVs in this manner,

The mapping system being used is relatively new this year. "

This mapping system will be our primary method of scene documentation at all of the Crash Reconstruction scenes we respond to whenever possible," Bockstadter says. "The only limitations to using this system are scenes with active precipitation in the form of rain or snow, or extreme winds.'

For the trainees, HHD has provided a safe, realistic training area with simulated roads that are out of the motoring public.

"We are able to spread out in the openair space to provide adequate room for the flight training and to stage up mock crash scenes for practical scenario-based training," Bockstadter says.



Demos show safe way to handle cattle simply

HUSKER HARVEST DAYS may have skipped a year, but the cattle demonstrations for the 2021 show will not skip a beat as "Dr. Joe" Jeffrey is back to narrate and offer commentary on the demos, just as he has for every cattle demo in past shows.

The 2020 Husker Harvest Days was another victim of COVID-19. But Jeffrey is ready to entertain this year at the cattle handling demos. It promises to be just as informative as in years past with side-by-side chute comparisons, and just as entertaining with his running commentary.

"We tell a few stories and have some fun, too," says Jeffrey, who uses humor to engage and inform the audiences. "It has been a lot of fun."

He says his lengthy veterinary career has provided him plenty of fodder for sto-

ries. "I worked for seven veterinarians, and they would send me on the calls that they didn't want to go on," he says.

Jeffrey enjoys teasing some of the chute operators, but he is quick to admit that the real stars of the show are the chute workers who make the demonstrations successful year after year, and the equipment itself.

"It is much more successful than I would have anticipated. The chutes have really improved over the years," he says. "The greatest changes have been how strong the chutes are built today, and that they are much safer for the livestock and the handlers."

Since live cattle handling demonstrations and side-by-side chute comparisons began with the 1988 show, they have

become an audience favorite as they look forward to seeing the latest chutes and technology demonstrated. It also helps that they are entertained by Jeffrey's banter.




That's just par for the course, according to Jeffrey. Bringing the equipment

Beef talks seek to engage, enlighten

THE BEEF INDUSTRY is facing its share of challenges, yet a range of opportunities still remains. Producers attending Husker Harvest Days will get a chance to enhance their management skills, gain some insight on marketing and learn more about how customer tastes are changing.

The beef seminars will be held between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. daily in the stands where livestock demonstrations take place, in the Livestock Industries Building, Lot 860 at the corner of Eighth Street and West Avenue. In the two hours, visitors can hear from three speakers:

Doug Ferguson. Also known as Mr. Cattlemaster online, Ferguson writes Doug's Market Intel, which now appears on the BEEF website. Ferguson grew up near Beatrice and worked a number of cattle-related jobs. He eventually turned his attention to buying some calves as a business, and attended marketing training with livestock handler Bud Williams, in-

cluding a stint at the Ranching for Profit school. Ferguson's innovative approach to cattle raising and marketing shows him there's always an opportunity to profit—even in a soft market.

Ferguson says his talk will include something on every segment of cattle production.

"I will begin with knowing and understanding yourself, covering where we got our paradigms on marketing and how to change them," he says. "Then I will discuss managing the inventory triangle, which is our second-greatest marketing advantage."

With that knowledge, Ferguson says he will cover how to use current market conditions by applying simple fundamentals of price relationships to capture value.

Galen Erickson. A cattle industry professor at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Erickson is also the beef feedlot

Extension specialist. He will explore key cattle nutrition questions, especially in a year that's challenging many with drought. His work has included incorporating byproducts for growing and finishing beef cattle, and using alternatives to grain for finishing cattle.

His presentation will offer timely insights for producers looking for potential feed alternatives if feed supplies get tight.

Ann Marie Bosshamer. As the executive director of the Nebraska Beef Council, Bosshamer is a recognized speaker in the region.

Her role at the council is management of staff and oversight of all checkoff programs, activities and functions. She also serves as a spokesperson for the beef industry and beef checkoff programs.

Bosshamer says she will talk about understanding today's beef consumer. "This session will provide insight into consumer preferences and explore their buying habits and perceptions of the beef industry," she notes.

Learn how to train your stock dog

"LIE DOWN, HEY, lie down," Tim Gifford snapped at his border collie Kat. "That'll do. That'll do."

Gifford, a Nebraska cattleman, trains herding dogs to work stock. He is a member of the National Cattledog Association and U.S. Border Collie Handler Association. He uses his dogs on his cowcalf operation to gather cows, move them from pasture to pasture and sort them in an alleyway.

Gifford will share his expertise multiple times a day during Husker Harvest Days. Now in their 10th year at the show, he and his dogs will be demonstrating his techniques at 9 a.m., 11 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m., along the north side of Flag Road, just outside the exhibit field. If you are planning to attend, here are a few takeaways to expect from his presentation:

1. Start them young. If you're buying a puppy and you know they are going to work livestock, train them. Teach them basic commands. More importantly, bring young dogs around the stock, Gifford says. It increases awareness and comfort levels

- 2. Herd small stock. No matter the size of the dog, if it is possible, begin training with small livestock like sheep or young calves. This provides safety for the dog, while also adding to its confidence. Plus, as a handler, Gifford says it is easier to maneuver the stock and the dog with smaller animals.
- 3. Get a stick. Handlers need a sorting stick to train. Sorting sticks are tall and bendable. They provide extra reach for the handler. It can be used to move the animals, but more importantly direct the dog.
- 4. Know the commands. There are five words every dog handler knows:
 - "Come by" tells the dog to move clockwise.
 - "Away to me" means move counterclockwise around the stock.
 - "Walk up" means to walk toward the

livestock, whether sheep or cattle.

- "Lie down" typically means stop and lie down.
- "That'll do" tells the dog work has finished and it must come back to
- 5. Move your body. Combining words with body movement during early training will help the dog understand which way to move. When you say "come by" and $make\,a\,move\,to\,the\,right, the\,dog\,sees\,and$ senses the direction.
- 6. Reward often. Gifford says it is important to reward the dog for the work. In the corral or pasture, it can be just a spoken word or a gentle pat on the head. "It lets the dog know they are doing good work," he adds. And it builds a strong bond between handler and dog.

Gifford has a gauge to know when a herding dog is fully trained. "Ultimately, I want to get to where I don't have to be in pen to tell her where to go," he explains. "I

don't have to sit in corral pens or on the gates. I want her to listen to me and know which way to go."

BRING YOUR DOG FOR TRAINING

HHD offers a unique opportunity for you to bring your dog for Gifford and his handlers to work. There will be a fee to work your dog and you must sign a waiver.

If you bring your dog, remember that it must stay on a leash and in the demonstration area. No dogs are allowed on the Husker Harvest Days site.

Learn to meet feed needs by baling corn residue

WITH FEEDSTUFFS LIKELY coming at a premium this drought year, ranchers will want to attend the cornstalk residue workshops and demonstrations during this year's Husker Harvest Days.

Brad Schick, Nebraska Extension beef systems educator, says Extension personnel will be sharing the latest research data, while representatives from equipment manufacturers will cover innovations in their latest products.

The cornstalk residue workshops are 1:30 to 2 p.m. daily, before the alfalfa raking and haying demos. The schedule is subject to change, so sign up for mobile text alerts via *HuskerHarvestDays.com*.

Current plans are to follow up the cornstalk residue workshop with baling demonstrations. But "weather and crop and equipment dependent, we will then be able to bale some cornstalks," Schick says.
"That would be the ideal. Two years ago, we weren't able to bale because it rained."

WORK CONTINUES THROUGH PANDEMIC

Even though the Husker Harvest Days show was canceled in 2020, Extension researchers did not take the year off. Schick says the workshops will begin with Extension sharing information on the effects on soil properties, feed quality and yield after baling.

"Our results haven't changed that much from what we have, but there's always ongoing research. So, if there's short-term data that we can provide, we will," he says.

Some of that information will center on how producers can get the most out of

their cornstalk residue to meet the needs of their livestock, and doing what's right for future production.


"There's always trade-offs on decisions we make on our ground, and in a year where you need feed, you might have to go beyond what we always feel comfortable with. But in the next few years, maybe leave some more or not take as much off," Schick says. "It also completely depends on your soil type or topography, on how often or how much you should bale. Corn residue can be also changed so it's even higher-quality feed after it's baled. We'll

talk about ammoniation, and making poorquality feeds higher-quality feeds."

Vendors will follow up the Extension portion to discuss changes in equipment settings and showcase the rakes and balers that manufacturers will have on hand.

Schick says he is looking forward to the in-person show by "being able to talk to other producers who are there and find out how they like to do it, too. Getting shoulder to shoulder with those producers and having those conversations, that's just as valuable as information we have."

It's a great opportunity for people to see a bull they may want to use in their program but have never had the chance to view in person."

The plan was to bring America to the 2020 Husker Harvest Days, but COVID-19

restrictions canceled the show. So, Herbster made arrangements to bring the bull this year.

America was purchased by Herbster at the 116th Schaff Angus Valley sale in St. Anthony, N.D., in February 2019. When the gavel fell making the sale final, auctioneer Joe Goggins noted the historic nature of the transaction, saying that the numbers involved in the bidding process were not the kinds of numbers normally used at a livestock auction.

So, what is so special about this bull, America? Born in January 2018, SAV America 8018 is valued at \$1.887 million, as the all-time, top selling, world-record son of SAV President 6847. Herbster also owns President, which he purchased from Schaff Angus Valley in 2017. President has a total valuation of \$935,500.

America shattered every record at Schaff Angus Valley, including weighing 1,107 pounds for his 205-day weight.

A one-of-a-kind breeding piece, with 80% semen interest bringing \$1.51 million, America was a long shot, resulting from a single embryo produced from the last flush out of an aged donor cow, SAV Madame Pride 0075. This cow is a Schaff Angus Valley matron and has produced over \$5.5 million in progeny sales to date.

TAKE A LOOK FOR YOURSELF

"We have always encouraged people to take the opportunity to visually appraise our cattle," Herbster says. "Bringing America to a central location like Husker Harvest Days lets them do that easily. So many people make decisions on someone else's word or by just looking at a photograph when buying semen," he adds. "We think enough of America to let people see him and make up their own minds on just how good he is," he adds. "America's phenotype is living proof that his fame is more than just hype."

Watch horse gentler tame wild colt

THE CHESTNUT COLT leaped off the stock trailer, ran to the far side of the corral and then back toward the trailer. Cutting from side to side, it desperately tried to find its way back inside the trailer, but the door was closed. Realizing there was no way out, the young colt began circling the corral, staying close to the rail. He was trying to avoid the man in the burgundy shirt, cowboy hat and chaps standing in the center of the pen.

With a wound lasso rope clutched in his hand, Ron Knodel stood still. Then slowly, he began to move in sync with the horse. "I'm trying to catch his eye," Knodel says. But the animal was flighty.

The brand on the colt explained its uneasiness. To mark a horse or burro as a wild horse managed on federally protected land, the Federal Bureau of Land Management uses "freeze branding."

The BLM manages and protects wild horses and burros on 26.9 million acres of public lands across 10 Western states. To manage the population in sync with available pastureland, it places animals in private care. Since 1971, more than 240,000 wild horses and burros were adopted by individuals, many who are ranchers. This was such a horse.

With each lap around the pen, the colt eased its pace until it stood still. Then the Nebraska horse gentler began to work.

The wild horse gentling training sessions conducted by Knodel have been a part of Husker Harvest Days for nearly 21 years. Over that time, he has probably demonstrated his technique with 250 horses.

The Federal BLM wild horse and burro facility in Elm Creek partners with Knodel to provide mustangs for the event. These mustangs have never been handled. After the Husker Harvest Days sessions, the horses are returned to the BLM for adop-

Knodel spends his life working with horses in different phases of training. He draws from his experience to bring these wild animals to civility over the course of the show. You can catch him every day Sept. 14-16 at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. on Lot 51E, just east of Syngenta Square.

TRUST ESTABLISHED: It took just under 30 minutes from the time the wild colt jumped off the trailer until the horse gentler could approach. "The goal," Ron Knodel tells a group at Husker Harvest Days in Grand Island, "is to get this animal to where it will work with you and for you in your operation. It just takes time and patience. It has to be a good experience for horse and handler." The white tufts of hair on the horse tells the tale of a short time spent on Bureau of Land Management property.




technology. Students and families can try out new technologies and learn more about NECC agriculture and applied science programs at this exhibit.

Stop by Big Red for latest UNL work

AG EDUCATION DISPLAYS on "Knowledge That Helps Cultivate Opportunities" will be offered by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, and Nebraska Extension at Husker Harvest Days.

The displays will be located in the UNL "Big Red Building" at Lot 827. Teams of Extension educators and specialists will share their field-proven experiences with new research-based, unbiased information. The variety of topics being offered should provide a wealth of information that could lead to more success and well-being in the lives of participants.

Farm and ranch economic and financial decisions can be hard to make. Faculty from the UNL Center for Agricultural Profitability will provide information to help people make good farm management decisions. The teams will cover these areas:

Beef systems. Cattle production is one of the most important agriculture industries

in Nebraska. The Beef Systems Team will provide information to help producers manage feed costs and maintain animal performance.

Animal manure management. Livestock always produce manure. Members of the UNL Animal Manure Management Team will emphasize that using livestock manure to fertilize cropland is nature's original recycling program, and recycling locally available manure is the key to protecting the environment.

Cover crops. Just like the use of manure on fields, planting cover crops will improve the ability of the soil to grow a crop. The Cover Crop Team will demonstrate how the small effort made to plant a cover crop will result in a large payback both financially and in land quality.

Water. Increasing soil organic matter, boosting water infiltration and reducing loss of soil nitrogen protect the quality of both surface and aquifer-held water. The

Water Issues Team will provide information on managing soil water and applying irrigation to increase crop production while conserving natural resources.

Digital ag and on-farm research. There have been significant improvements in the equipment that farmers use to produce their crops and to record yield data. The Digital Agriculture and On-farm Research Team will highlight the ease of conducting on-farm research and how farmers can use reliable yield data to guide them on future management decisions.

Pests. Pests change in their occurrence and response to control tactics; thus, they're a challenge to manage. The Pest Management Team will highlight research on pest control, pesticide resistance management and emerging pest problems.

Trees. Trees bring significant value to farms and landscapes by blocking the wind, reducing soil erosion and providing habitat for wildlife. The Community

Environment Team will provide information that will help farmers and home residents select the right trees and maintain tree health.

Mental health. Stress can happen to all people, and it is important to understand that it is normal to feel overwhelmed, particularly during tough times. The Healthy Lifestyles and Wellness Team will help people learn to maintain their well-being and be able to recognize when family and friends may need assistance.

LEAD program. To prosper, communities need people to provide leadership. The administrator of the Nebraska LEAD Program will share information about how participants can develop the skills needed to help lead rural communities.

Ag careers. Young people need training to establish a career and contribute to their communities. The Agriculture Career Zone Team will offer information on agricultural careers, preparation for post high school training and markers for career success.

In addition to providing program information, the institute's faculty will be available to answer crop and animal production questions.

4 join NRD Hall of Fame

OVER THE PAST several years, the Nebraska Association of Natural Resources Districts has used the backdrop of Husker Harvest Days to announce its conservation heroes with the NRD Hall of Fame.

Due to COVID-19 and the cancellation of Husker Harvest Days in 2020, NARD will be honoring Hall of Fame inductees for both 2020 and 2021 at this year's farm show. The announcement ceremony is scheduled for 2 p.m. Sept. 15 on the Husker Harvest Days Hospitality Tent stage.

The honorees at this year's HHD follow: NRD board member 2020 — W. Eugene Haarberg. Nominated by the Upper Republican NRD, Eugene Haarberg of Imperial is being honored posthumously. Haarberg was lauded during his lifetime for service on the Upper Republican NRD board of directors from the district's inception in 1972 until 2000.

As a lifelong Chase County farmer, he first served as a representative of Class

II cities, working with the Unicameral to establish the NRD and the Groundwater Management and Protection Act that authorized NRDs to regulate groundwater.

NRD board member 2021 — Ted Hughes. Ted Hughes of Neligh was nominated by the Upper Elkhorn NRD. He was first appointed to that NRD's board of directors in 1986 to fill a vacancy in Sub-district 6. He was elected to that same position in 1988 and went on to serve there for 34 years.

As a farmer in Antelope County, Hughes has always been interested in natural resources and environmental quality. He advocated strongly over the years to find local solutions to local problems, and helped the NRD develop programming and policies following that same principle.

NRD employee — Leon Koehlmoos. Nominated by the Lower Loup NRD, Leon "Butch" Koehlmoos of Ord is a former general manager of the Lower Loup NRD. He retired in 2017 after serving for 39 years.

Natural resource aid honored

Annually, the Natural Resources Districts announce three outstanding individuals to induct into the NRD Hall of Fame — board member, employee and supporter. These individuals have made significant contributions to protect the state's natural resources.

Current NRD managers and Nebraska Association of Resources Districts (NARD) directors vote for nominated candidates. NRD Hall of Fame inductees are also formally honored at the Nebraska Association of Resources Districts' annual conference.

NARD works with individual districts to protect lives, property and the future of Nebraska's natural resources. NRDs are unique to Nebraska, and act as local government entities with broad responsibilities to protect Nebraska's natural resources.

Major Nebraska river basins form the boundaries of the 23 NRDs, enabling districts to respond to local conservation and resource management needs. Learn more at *nrdnet.org*.

Under his management, Lower Loup designated its first groundwater quality area and commissioned a study, the Elkhorn-Loup Modeling Project, that sought to determine the effects on future groundwater development. The study served as a precursor in the establishment of processes to grant variances and certify irrigated acres.

NRD supporter — **Doug Bereuter.** The Upper Big Blue NRD nominated Doug Bereuter of Almo, Calif. A former Nebraska legislator from 1974 to 1978 and then a U.S. representative in 1978, serving for 26 years

in the House, Bereuter helped create the natural resources fund for special projects and assisted in making the NRD the implementing agency for the Soil and Water Conservation Commission.

In Congress, he was instrumental in helping pass legislation that opened the door for federal assistance through the Water Resources Development Act.

While the inductees will be officially announced at HHD, they or their families will receive their awards at the Nebraska Association of Resources Districts Conference in Kearney on Sept. 27-28.



Natural Resources Hub offers 3 reasons for you to visit

THE NATURAL RESOURCES Hub on Lot 39E at Husker Harvest Days offers visitors a chance to take home free trees and seeds, and some advice.

Here are three things you won't want to miss while lingering in the Natural Resources Districts Building:

1. Free trees and seeds. Husker Harvest Days visitors can pick up a free native prairie grass seed packet at the Natural Resources Hub. Prairie seed goes quickly, so make the NRD Hub your first stop.

The NRD Conservation Tree Program helps landowners plant thousands of trees each year to benefit people and animals. Colorado blue spruce tree seedlings are also free to visitors in the Natural Resources Districts' building.

All 23 Nebraska NRDs administer tree planting programs to provide trees and shrubs for local landowners. Each district varies, but possible services include:

- planting
- weed barrier installation or control
- irrigation

2. Water testing. The Water Well Standards Program with the Nebraska Department of Environment and Energy will also be on-site to provide free water testing, which can screen for nitrates within minutes. Private well owners should bring a cup-sized sample of water in a clean container.

3. Cost-share conversation. Along with the NRDs, agriculture producers can meet with various conservation agencies that offer assistance, cost-share opportunities and agricultural programs all at the Natural Resources Hub.

Some of the organizations include the Nebraska Forest Service, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, USDA Farm Service Agency, Nebraska Department of Natural Resources, the Platte River Recovery Implementation Program, the Rainwater Basin Joint Venture, and Central Platte NRD's Native Prairie and Pollination Awareness Program.

Demos teach safety near power lines

LOOK OUT, LOOK up, live.

A simple phrase that is the underlying message warning of overhead danger wherever farmers and overhead power lines coexist.

"We can't get it out enough about avoiding contact with electrical lines that have fallen on the ground," says Todd Bailey, safety director and purchasing manager for the Southern Public Power District based in Grand Island. "Prime examples: As farmers return to their fields in the spring, we know that they're getting out there with the disk or cultivator. We seem to always have individual farmers that hit a guy wire or a pole, and that wire comes down."

After a hot wire falls is when the trouble can begin. Bailey stresses the importance of staying in your vehicle or the cab of your farm equipment to wait for a utility company to show up.

Bailey says too many unknowns in such

situations can lead to injury or death. The risk potential is increased as more and larger agricultural equipment is on the roads and in the fields.

"Now we have agricultural sprayers, along with airplanes spraying, that may come in contact with the lines," he says.

Linemen from multiple electrical utilities that make up the Southern Public Power District will be at the south end of the show grounds to demonstrate the power that is in the overhead lines, and why farmers and motorists need to avoid it.

REPETITION BREEDS FAMILIARITY

"Alot of what we talk about out there might seem repetitive to folks who have been there time and time again," says LeAnne Doose, public relations coordinator with Southern Public Power District. However, "our local farmers will sometimes employ people from a nearby town who is not on the farm daily and exposed to our messages constantly.... It's always necessary to bring that information forward, because there are those occasions when there's somebody to whom this is brand-new information. And we know that the more our local farmers and customers hear our safety information, the more likely they are to remember when they are working hard on their farm."

HOT DOG UNDER FIRE

Utility linemen will have a hot-line trailer to demonstrate the damage that 7,200 volts can do to multiple items, such as a hot dog. A lineman, using proper safety equipment, will lay a hot dog on the power line, and unlike a hot dog hot off a grill, the tube steak will not have grill marks on the outside, but rather "when you break that hot dog open, there's a burn line that goes right through the center," Doose says.

"What that demonstrates to people is that when you touch a power line, it burns

you on the inside," she adds.

Bailey says other demos, that occur every 15 to 20 minutes depending on crowd flow, will show what happens when a variety of items such as a kite string, irrigation pipe or critters come in contact with a power line.

"We show how every service that we have has a primary cutout, which is called a fool's door, and we show that exploding when it comes in contact with, maybe, a squirrel or a 'coon," he says. "What you see on this trailer is a complete small version of a line feeding into a residential home."

Power of propane to be highlighted at HHD exhibit

HOMEOWNERS AND FARMERS have long known the benefits of heating their homes, shops and barns with propane, but that is only the tip of the iceberg of how propane can be used on farms.

Some of those other uses will be on full display by the Propane Education & Research Council. Find the display at the Nebraska Propane Gas Association located at Lot 654 on Sixth Street during this year's Husker Harvest Days.

"The Husker Harvest Days show offers a great opportunity to showcase the many benefits of propane-powered irrigation engines and farm equipment," says Mike Newland, PERC director of agriculture business development.

"We are excited to return to the show in-person this year to discuss the use of new propane equipment directly with the producers who can benefit from it the most, as well as feature equipment both on display and in action," he says.

PROPANE INCREASES EFFICIENCY

Some of that equipment on display at this year's booth includes several models of new propane-powered irrigation engines, including Industrial Irrigation's new Reliable Horsepower engine line, and engines from Husker Power Products and Anderson Industrial Engines.

There will also be water pumping demonstrations of a Reliable Horsepower engine to give attendees a firsthand look at the engine's power and efficiency. This line features seven different engines that are all certified by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, including propanededicated engines and VI-fuel engines.

In addition to these propane ag products, the booth will have a propanepowered pickup, provided by Otte Oil & Propane from Davey; a standby generator; and a propane grill.

Visitors to the Nebraska Propane Gas Association will also have the opportunity to win an Orca cooler by signing up for the Ag Post e-newsletter by PERC.

DISCUSSING FARM INCENTIVES

PERC will also be offering its Propane Farm Incentive Program again, which provides

up to \$5,000 toward the purchase of qualifying propane-powered irrigation engines and other equipment.

The Nebraska Propane Gas Association also is offering an additional \$750 incentive to producers who irrigate in Nebraska, — adding up to a potential \$5,750 available to show attendees interested in buying new propane-powered irrigation engines.

Manufacturer representatives, as well Nebraska Propane Gas Association and PERC representatives, will be on-site to discuss the benefits of propane equipment and provide information on national and state incentives available toward equipment purchases.

Antique farm equipment gets new show location

ANTIQUE FARMING EQUIPMENT has been a popular attraction at Husker Harvest Days for more than 30 years. Farmers, both young and old, enjoy seeing where agriculture has been with these antique displays, along with learning about where agriculture is going through the present-day farm technology exhibits and demonstrations on the show grounds.

Visitors looking for older equipment at Husker Harvest Days should head to the antique tractor exhibits in the southeast corner of the show grounds on Lot 1122. This year the location of the display moved, but there are plenty of exhibitors

to talk with, many of them have attended each and every HHD show dating back to the beginning.

During the show's 40th anniversary in 2017, several exhibit organizers brought tractors and tillage implements that were not quite antiques but had been used during the first show in 1978. Some of the organizers at this year's event actually helped in fall 1977 to prepare the field site before the first show in 1978.

Many of the tractors on display have been meticulously restored to their former glory, so they have a little shine in the paint and gloss on the tires. Organizer

Howard Raymond of Wellfleet says at this year's show, organizers are planning to display antique lawn tractors and small engines, as well as large farm tractors.

While many of those helping with the antique displays use the latest in tech-

nology and equipment on their own farms, they enjoy looking back to the history of agriculture and preserving that heritage.

So step back in time at Husker Harvest Days and visit the antique tractor display for the latest in old iron.

Nebraska National Guard to display its equipment

WHETHER IT'S PROVIDING relief to humans and their livestock during blizzards or floods, or helping during a pandemic, the Nebraska National Guard is always quick to answer the call.

When the state's National Guard isn't busy delivering hay and other relief supplies to those in need, it finds time to show up at Husker Harvest Days for one of the show's most popular exhibits. Guard members and their display will be stationed near the southwest entrance.

Staff Sgts. Matthew Wonder and Schuyler Schoenhofer say the National Guard will have an impressive showing at this year's Husker Harvest Days, as requests have been made to have a CH-47 Chinook helicopter, a Blackhawk helicopter and a UH72 Lakota helicopter at the show, Wonder says. He assures that at least one of the helicopters will be on the show grounds.

As in years past, show visitors will be able to climb aboard the helicopters and visit with a pilot.

"Everyone is allowed to walk up, look in the cockpit," he says. "They can go into the actual loading area. They are free to roam about; they just can't go into the cockpit."

A request has also been made to have

an 1165 up-armored Humvee, and visitors will be able to sit in the Humvee, look under the hood and see how up-armored Humvees are different.

FOCUS ON YOUNGER GENERATION

Another exhibit the National Guard hopes to have on display is a STEM trailer, to show attendees how the Nebraska National Guard fits into the science, technology, engineering and mathematics disciplines that make up STEM curricula.

"Our focus is that younger generation

coming over to our booth," Schoenhofer says, "so the STEM trailer is targeted toward them to show them how we [National Guard] fit into the STEM careers."

Also at the show will be some virtual-reality items and a station where show-goers will be able to build and program a mini robot. Visitors will also be able to drive and control an explosive ordnance disposal robot.

The STEM trailer and the Humvee are confirmed for the show, while the helicopters' presence depends on them not being

needed for military service.

"Our biggest focus, especially this year, is just letting people get their hands on different items, or hands on the equipment that we have that we use whether here or overseas," Schoenhofer says.

And, as usual, the Nebraska National Guard will offer items such as yardsticks, towels or hats, so visitors aren't leaving empty-handed.

ON CALL WITH GUARD

Various units of the Nebraska National Guard were called to duty to help in the fight against COVID-19, as soldiers were brought in to facilitate the testing and direction of operations associated with the pandemic at Lincoln, Omaha and other areas across Nebraska.

About 300 Nebraska Guardsmen were also sent to Washington, D.C., during President Joe Biden's inauguration, as well as providing support for local police during protests.

The Nebraska National Guard began with the official organization of the Nebraska militia by an act of the territorial legislature in 1856.

Efficiency key to top irrigating state of Nebraska

NEBRASKA IS THE most irrigated state in the country in terms of acres. That's why it is fitting that Husker Harvest Days, the largest totally irrigated working farm show, calls the state its home.

Nearly 8.6 million acres are under irrigation in Nebraska. Compare that to 1954, when about 2.1 million acres were under irrigation. At that time, there were just 11,500 groundwater irrigation wells in the state. Today, that number has soared to 96,000 or more. But the change has come in technology and efficiency of use. Farmers are producing much more grain with less water.

In the 2019 Nebraska Water Productivity Report by the Robert B. Daugherty Water for Food Global Institute, researchers noted several facts about irrigation in the state that make the management of its water resources stand out.

CENTER-PIVOT EFFICIENCY

Nebraska may be the most irrigated state, but farmers and ranchers won't let water go to waste. In an observed shift to more efficient irrigation systems that moved from gravity flow toward center pivots, one study showed that irrigation application across Natural Resources Districts at Central Platte, Lower Niobrara and Tri-Basin, as an example, had dropped by 20% between 2004 and 2013.

The development of the center-pivot sprinkler has a lot to do with this improvement in efficiency. In 1954, more than 90% of irrigated acres were being watered from flood irrigation systems.

When Frank Zybach invented his center-pivot sprinkler in the late 1940s, and it became more commercially available, it was a game changer. Today, about 91% of irrigation water is applied through center pivots in Nebraska, with 9% by gravity flow and less than 1% through modern low-flow or subsurface drip.

ACRES UP. WATER USE DOWN

While irrigated acres in Nebraska have quadrupled since 1959, total applied irrigation water between 1978 and 2012 shows an increase of just 14%. Nebraska may be the most irrigated state, but its total applied irrigation water is close to one-third of California's.

Pivots could be the difference, with 78% of irrigated acres in California covered with gravity systems, compared to only 22% watered with center pivots.

Both irrigated and rain-fed yields have gone up since 1960, with improved crop genetics, high-producing hybrid varieties, and better management techniques and technologies for nutrients, water and soil.

Irrigation started as early as the 1850s

in the Nebraska Territory, just after the region had been opened to settlement. Over 9,000 acres were under irrigation as early as 1889. But farmers, ranchers and the irrigation industry have worked hard over the past several decades to develop and adopt delivery methods like the pivot

and subsurface drip to conserve water and still get just enough water to the crop when it needs it to boost yields and productivity without wasting resources.








I NEVER WORKED with anyone as harddriving as Terry Butzirus. Terry was Nebraska Farmer's advertising and sales

manager for four decades, and never left a stone unturned when locating ag companies and persuading them to advertise their products or services.

"If there's smoke coming out the chimney," he said of any business he drove by, "I'll stop and get them to advertise."

Wayne Carroll, former sales manager at Landoll Co., a Kansas-based firm that makes tillage tools, trailers and construction equipment, knew and dealt with Terry

for over 30 years. "He was a great guy who always had time to do business and then just visit. He was very knowledgeable about the industry," Carroll says.

Phil Landoll, special projects manager for Landoll, says Terry was like part of the family: "When we got together for business, we'd often manage to find time for golf."

At Husker Harvest Days, Terry was always behind the scenes contacting advertisers and making sure their needs were met. He would spend at least two weeks in Grand Island before the show to help get exhibitors situated.

"He helped make HHD what it is today," says Diane Bybee, his as-

sistant advertising manager at Nebraska Farmer who worked alongside Terry for 40 years. "He knew the ag market and was a straight shooter about the advantages of advertising with the magazine."

Nebraska editor Curt Arens appreciated the help Terry gave him concerning state agriculture and ag companies. "He helped build advertising sales and helped build Husker Harvest Days," Arens says.

At home in Lincoln, Terry was dedicated to his wife, Pat; sons Atlee and Stuart; and daughters Heather and Heidi; and his five granddaughters. He was active in sports with his family.

'A great guy to work with'

YOU REALLY CAN'T talk about live cattle handling demonstrations at Husker Harvest Days without mentioning John Kearney. He was a vital part of the cattle handling demos, including the first session that demonstrated only three livestock chutes.

For well over 30 years, John worked with Lexington veterinarian and entertainer, Dr. Joe Jeffrey, to educate HHD audiences. John, age 72 of Overton, passed away on July 13, 2020, at the CHI Good Samaritan Hospital in Kearney.

Born on Jan. 16, 1948, John graduated from St. Ann's High School in Lexington in 1966. He worked for area farmers until he entered the U.S. Army in 1968. After his service, John worked as a welder at Perkins Manufacturing, and later as a salesman for Big Valley and Behlen Manufacturing, traveling all over the country to farm shows like HHD.

FOUNDING FATHER

When HHD added live cattle handling and side-by-side chute demonstrations, John was one of the early

organizers. "He was a great guy to work with," says Jeffrey of his old friend. "He was fun to be around. John always had his talk ready to go during the chute presentations, and we would try to trip him up. But he never missed a beat."

Jeffrey, along with chute operators and sales staff from different companies, who put on the cattle handling at HHD worked hard to build the demonstrations into something that was educational and entertaining. "We had a lot of fun teasing each other," Jeffrey says. He notes how early organizers like John worked together to make the demonstrations as popular as they have become.

Jeffrey says that John was very good with people and knew how to talk with producers. When he wasn't working, he enjoyed hunting, fishing, going out to eat and attending church. He was buried with military honors at St. Ann's Cemetery in Lexington.

The team at Husker Harvest Days, as well as Nebraska Farmer magazine, extends our sincere condolences to the Kearney family, and gratitude for all of John's hard work in building up HHD cattle handling over the years.






